Specific activities of the University Curriculum Committee were reported regularly to the members of Faculty Council through the distribution of the minutes of each of the Committee meetings. In addition to the regular curricular items concerning courses and program proposals, the following items were handled by the Committee and approved by the Faculty Council:

1. Revised procedures for offering experimental courses.
2. Conducted a study and developed policy and procedures for the use of unique titles for experimental courses.
3. Established a subcommittee of the University Curriculum Committee to review academic courses offered through the Center for Continuing Education.
4. Developed criteria to be followed by departments in the development of and offering of joint-listed courses.
5. Broadened the pass/fail and instructor option grading for courses.

General Committee work:

1. Established a subcommittee of the University Curriculum Committee to review general education requirements in undergraduate programs of study.
2. Established a subcommittee of the University Curriculum Committee to study internships, practicums, affiliations, and field placement courses.

Consideration of these topics is underway.

Requests have been received for the Committee to review general areas of responsibility on campus for counseling, computer programming, law, and other academic areas where proliferation of courses might exist or might develop in the future. Consideration of these topics is scheduled for summer and fall 1976-77.
