Discussion Item: UCC Committee Responsibilities and Operating Procedures

<u>UCC Committee Responsibilities – Faculty Manual Section C</u>:

k. University Curriculum Committee (last revised June 22, 2006)

The University Curriculum Committee shall consist of one (1) faculty representative from each college and the Libraries, one (1) undergraduate student, one (1) graduate student, and the Provost or his or her designee (ex officio). The duties of this standing committee shall be:

- 1. To receive or initiate recommendations pertaining to each and every course and program offered for academic credit by any unit of the University.
- 2. To evaluate all proposals for new undergraduate courses and programs as well as changes in existing courses and programs for correlation with other departments before consideration and approval by the Faculty Council.
- 3. To evaluate all proposals for new graduate courses and programs as well as changes in existing courses and programs for correlation with other departments. Review of graduate programs is conducted after the Committee on Scholarship, Research, and Graduate Education has recommended approval prior to their submission to the Faculty Council for approval.
- To develop necessary administrative procedures for informing interested colleges concerning courses under consideration.
- 5. To evaluate proposals for the establishment of new departments, and the change of academic name, change in college affiliation, dissolution, division, or merger of existing departments.
- 6. To recommend policies to the Faculty Council related to the operations of the Division of Continuing Education which impact curricula.

Below is the most updated information regarding the proctoring options available to faculty and students for CSU online and on campus exams. The University Testing Center is pleased to coordinate the three proctoring options and to serve as a resource for faculty and students.

Update on Proctoring

In early May of this year, following the recommendations of a Task Force convened to study online proctoring options, and after discussion with faculty, Faculty Council, and CSU administration, CSU Online requested competitive bids for proctoring services for Fall 2017 online courses. In July, a two-year agreement with ProctorU was reached. For those who have utilized ProctorU in the past, little has changed. Competition and technological improvements in electronic proctoring have also resulted in reduced costs to the University. The contract with ProctorU provides for the service of "Live Launch, Record, and Review" product at a significant savings (roughly 80%) over previous costs. In early fall, information will be shared regarding additional features to be rolled out for the spring semester 2018. A single fee will cover all courses taken by both online and campus students, and contrasts with the past charge-per-exam model. The ProctorU proctor will verify the student's identity, launch the exam, and be on standby for any issues. ProctorU will review the exam and report the results within six hours. Proctoring for CSU Online courses

Beginning this fall, CSU Online will pay proctoring fees for any student in any sections offered by CSU Online in the fall, spring, and summer. Students will not need to pay any additional fees for ProctorU "Live Launch, Record, and Review" in any other course at the University, campus or online. While proctoring is encouraged and paid for in courses managed through CSU Online, proctoring is not required. The use of ProctorU remains at the discretion of the instructor. For specific instructions on using ProctorU in your course, faculty members may contact Briana Maxim of ProctorU at <u>bmaxim@proctoru.com</u> or (916) 993-3155. This is a quick but important step in the process.

Proctoring for campus courses

Departments that wish to provide proctoring for campus courses may do so under this contract. In such cases, the cost would be borne by the department or students (as determined by the department), unless the student has taken an online course covered by the new annual contract via ProctorU, which covers all courses/exams for that student for the academic year. It remains important to inform students in the course syllabi of any proctoring requirements in all relevant courses.

All proctoring services for CSU Online and on campus are managed by the University Testing Center. There are three options available for instructors and students to utilize for online courses: Proctoring at the University Testing Center, ProctorU, and distance proctoring.
